Who are we?

LCMO is a grassroots <u>Environmental Conservation Non– Governmental Organization</u> operating in Western Tanzania. LCMO's mission is to promote conservation with all means and improve community livelihoods. By aiming to mitigate human wildlife conflict and enhance nature-related research, LCMO aims to explore innovative pathways to develop community-based conservation initiatives with ecotourism, wildlife and cultural activities. Currently, LCMO has two main environmental programs: <u>Watu, Simba na Mazingira</u> (WASIMA) and <u>Vijana na Mazingira</u> (VIMA) operating in remote villages around Katavi National Park, and other parts of western Tanzania. Other programs that are integrated with these two foci, include A Day in the Park, Greening Campaign and Student Support program.



This is the main view of River Ikuu on the dry season, the lifeline of Katavi National Park and adjacent villages in the south of the park. The river is well known as a paradise for hosting thousands of crocodiles and hippopotamuses. Some years back, the river used to dry up during the dry season and created hard times for water dwelling and other wildlife species. Of course it was a sight that no one will enjoy looking at it. Recently the trend has changed, efforts by the Tanzania National Parks Authority and in collaboration with the Katavi regional government have helped revive the Katuma River Basin and Ikuu supply water throughout the season. A game drive along this river always guarantee a fulfilling experience of witnessing different magnificent wildlife but the most striking is witnessing herds of elephants having a mud bath along the river bank.

GREENING CAMPAIGN

In the season which ended in early April 2022, LCMO produced 20,664 tree seedlings from the following species of trees: *Gliricidia sepium, Tectona grandis, Gmelina arborea, Papaya spp, Azadirachta indica (neem tree), Melia azedarach spp, lemon spp, Acrocarpus fraxinifolius, cashew spp and Albizia spp* at our own tree nursery in Mpimbwe. Part of these seedlings produced were used to commission the regional tree planting campaign in Mpimbwe.

Most of our tree seedlings were shared to the communities around Mpimbwe, with a small number shared to farmers in Nkasi and Mlele Districts. Schools have also been great partners in this program and 10 schools in Mpimbwe have improved their compounds through this program.

OUTREACH AND FILM SHOW

In this half, we have been able to conduct 11 public outreach education and night film shows in 11 villages; two from Nkasi District, four from Sikonge District and five from Mpimbwe District Council. We have also reached a significant number of people in all the villages; about 3025 people.

Beside interactive talks, questions and answers LCMO also shared 1800 Swahili brochures with interesting topics on WASIMA campaign, the concept of Living Walls as a carnivore deterrent measure and another on wildlife trophies (with a legal context on management of wildlife trophies).

We also provided 52 LCMO designed calendars as promotional materials especially to the most interactive people during our outreach as rewards. But LCMO also ensured the far end villages not easily accessible were reached through radio program by which in this first half, LCMO had seven live session on Mpanda FM that also brought in '*conservation conservations*' from our close stakeholders at regional level, TANAPA and TAWA.

YOUTH EDUCATION PROGRAM

Since January, we successful conducted three ecological study trip with a group of 98 students from Usevya, Mamba and Chamalendi Secondary School to ecologically significant sites such as community forests, water catchment areas, Wildlife Management Areas and eco-friendly livelihood projects to give students real-world experience and improve their awareness on environmental conservation.

Through our ongoing environmental clubs program in schools, we have been able to engage 1093 students from 11 schools who are active members of environment clubs in their respective schools. These groups participated in different indoor activities such as discussions, presentations, wildlife film shows, animal matching games, wildlife identification, crafting and painting while outdoor activities entailed recycling plastic bottles, developing wildlife sculptures, outdoor learning – mainly bird watching and tree planting.

We are also working to improve our environmental education teaching guide that aligns with news goals of our strategic plan which is under the review stage. The new teaching guide focuses on empowering teachers to be able to deliver environmental education and related activities on their own.

PARK TRIP TO KATAVI NATIONAL PARK

In this half, we organized for a single park visit by the Sitalike, Igongwe and Matandalani Community to Katavi National Park in collaboration with Tanzania National Parks Authority (TANAPA). The trip involved community members who have been victims of human wildlife conflict but also played a role in reporting problem animal to the LCMO early warning system operators.

A total of 41 people visited the park and in the evening we had an insightful presentation and discussion session. Each trip participant was also given an educative brochures on 'Living Walls' that shows how to design a lion proof livestock shed but also another one on human elephant conflict mitigation.

COMMUNITY HEALTH PROGRAM

This is a program initiated in 2019 through the support of Nomad Tanzania. Since its inception, we provided a free eye clinic to over 200 people and the ongoing initiative is a rehabilitative surgery program that focus on children with treatable disabilities. LCMO works to identify them during our outreach activities and facilitate their transfer to Arusha for treatment. Since January to June, 16 children have been taken to Plaster House Centre for treatment and the list is still long and waiting for appointment in the coming months.

UPDATES ON MALIASILI INITIATIVE PARTNERSHIP AND ACLN

Early this year, LCMO started developing a strategic plan under the support of Maliasili Initiative. The team held a workshop in Mpanda to review the outcomes of the *organizational assessment* and *situation analysis* conducted in 2021and and develop LCMO strategy. The document is under development and a first strategic plan draft validation meeting will be held in September together with board members.

In addition to this, LCMO leaders; Jonathan and Emmanuel finished their leadership training under *African Conservation Leadership Network* (ACLN) which is supported by Maliasili Initiative and The Nature Conservancy. ACLN works to support dynamic, creative, and influential African conservation leaders.

STRENGTHENING PARTNERSHIP FOR COMMUNITY BASED CONSERVATION

LCMO works closely with community owned Wildlife Management Areas in aspect of capacity building through Sungusungu and Village Game Scout training and equipment support, village council committees' seminars and supporting rural alternative livelihood projects and human wildlife coexistence education.

In this half, LCMO has been active in co-supporting patrol activities in Mpimbwe Wildlife Management Area, facilitated meetings with the newly elected officials of Ipole Wildlife Management Area and stakeholders to discuss challenges and ways we can foster collaboration. Also in prospect for expansion to remotely potential areas for lion existence, LCMO also visited Uyumbu Wildlife Management Area in Urambo district to assess the its situation and ways LCMO can engage in the future.

LCMO through WASIMA also visited villages bordering Ugalla River National Park to assess the potential of expanding to those villages where records of human lion conflict recorded recently.
